 In 2018, TACA reached new heights. Thanks to all the support TACA receives, we were able to increase program investment 12%. Thanks to this investment, we had the ability to respond to more than 47,000 calls/emails from parents and caregivers reaching out for help. We were able to distribute over 4,000 Journey Guides to new families and educate over 2,000 people at conferences. We had the ability to host family outreach events where over 30,000 people received support from TACA. We are so grateful to have been able to answer every knock on our door.

We strive to be a beacon of hope for families living with autism in as many ways as we can. In 2018, TACA launched the Facebook group Hope and Help for Autism. This private group is a safe place for the autism community to support each other, ask questions, and most importantly find different ways to help and spread hope. With nearly 6,000 members in all 50 states, this group has grown into a strong resource for TACA families. I am so inspired by this community of strength and perseverance. TACA families are true warriors.

Autism rates continue to rise dramatically. In 2018, the rate of autism soared to 1 in 59 children diagnosed with autism, yet autism is the least funded disability in America. With the growing number of families looking for guidance, we will continue to strive to support families and children affected by autism.

The TACA team is truly a team to be thankful for. In 2018, TACA had over 1,000 volunteers who logged in 25,000 hours to continue to help families living with autism. We are so appreciative of our volunteers' kindness and dedication to the cause. We are incredibly grateful for our friends and supporters that give to TACA through inkind products, services, or monetary donations to offset our costs so we can continue meeting the growing needs of families living with autism. 
